While still being curtailed by COVID, NorthSite delivered 30 high quality exhibitions in 2022, including international project *Never So Visible*, in collaboration with the Pacific Centre for Photographic Arts; and our Cairns Indigenous Art Fair (CIAF) season, including Teho Ropeyarn's *Traversing Three Realms: The physical, natural and spiritual.*

After two years of lockdowns, these were tremendously impactful exhibitions, which found an incredibly receptive and supportive Cairns audience. Our hardworking and dedicated team were able to deliver an ambitious program. Through the teams' ingenuity, flexibility and commitment, we saw the year-end with a significant profit and larger equity reserves. The Board thanks NorthSite's staff Ashleigh Campbell, Rebecca Youdell, Aven Noah Jr., Melania Jack, Jamaylya Ballangarry-Kearins, Jamie Clarke and Lauren Carter. A special welcome to Hamish Sawyer, who joined NorthSite as Acting Director whilst Ashleigh Campbell is on maternity leave, and our newest recruit, Katrina losia, who is responsible for leading our education programs and artist workshops.

Looking forward, NorthSite will prioritise a forward-thinking, outwardlooking program that platforms the contemporary art of Far North Queensland in dialogue with national and international practices. We will build upon existing relationships with leading artists in the region and those with cultural and personal connections to it, commissioning ambitious new projects that advance the profile and reputation of contemporary practice in the Far North. Our commitment to First Nations artists and culture will continue raising people through employment and annual flagship projects, showcasing exciting developments in practice.





We thank outgoing Board member Murray Jones for his service and tireless efforts in updating our corporate policies.

On behalf of the NorthSite Board, I would like to acknowledge the Queensland Government, Arts Queensland, Australia Council for the Arts, Cairns Regional Council, Ian Potter Foundation, John T Reid Trusts and the Australian Government's Regional Arts Fund for their support throughout 2022. Their support allowed NorthSite to implement its vision to be the leading contemporary arts organisation in northern Australia.

A heartfelt thanks to InkMasters Cairns Ltd's generosity, who, after winding up their organisation, made the largest-ever donation to NorthSite. Significant resources totalling \$183,587 in donations in printmaking assets and print collection will support NorthSite to deliver programs into the future.

Moving into 2023, we intend to streamline our program, allowing for enhanced engagement with local audiences and providing our staff with the necessary time and resources to develop projects to their full potential. This shift also acknowledges the increased scale and ambition of our exhibitions, and partnerships with national and international peer organisations.

We will continue to grow opportunities for local artists to develop their practice. Our new NorthSite Art Studios facility will feature prominently in this endeavour. In addition, there is exciting potential for professional studio and residential accommodation, enabling artists from Cape York, Torres Strait and further afield to visit Cairns and produce work for NorthSite exhibitions and retail, as well as external opportunities.

NorthSite's contribution to the national artistic landscape is reflected in exhibiting artists being selected for major opportunities such as *The National 4: New Australian Art Now*, as well as exhibitions at QAGOMA, Artisan, and Outer Space, Brisbane.

ACTING DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE





I joined NorthSite in late 2022, prior to Artistic Director and CEO Ashleigh Campbell going on maternity leave. On behalf of NorthSite's board and staff, I send warmest congratulations to Ashleigh, John and Maceo on the arrival of baby Lucinda.

I am grateful for the opportunity to join this vital organisation at a pivotal moment in its history. NorthSite plays a leading role in the development and presentation of contemporary visual art in Far North Queensland, one of Australia's most culturally diverse and dynamic arts ecologies. I'm excited to be working with the amazing NorthSite team to deliver the 2023 program and develop longer-term, strategic priorities.

2022 saw NorthSite and Cairns re-emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic. Tourists are gradually but surely returning to Tropical North Queensland, and with lockdowns and social distancing restrictions easing, it was wonderful to welcome audiences back into our gallery and retail space at Bulmba-ja. Highlights for the year include our Sounded Out event and the CIAF Artist Party, which has become the hot ticket during the festival's week-long celebrations.

NorthSite supported over 500 artists in 2022, across creative and professional development, presentation, workshop facilitation and retail activities, demonstrating the integral and multi-faceted role that the organisation plays in the visual arts ecology of the Tropical North Queensland.

The 2022 exhibition program showcased leading practices from the region, alongside their national and international peers, with a focus on artists with connections to Northern Australia, and the Indo-Pacific. Highlights included Matthew Stanton's *Deep North*, an exhibition of large-scale colour photographs documenting the beauty and fragility of the local environment; and *Never So Visible*, an exhibition focused on personal experience and intimacy curated by the Pacific Centre for Photographic Arts.

NorthSite's strong commitment to First Nations practice was demonstrated through our ambitious satellite program for the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair, which included Teho Ropeyarn's solo exhibition *Traversing Three Realms: The physical, natural and spiritual* and the first Cairns presentation of Dr Ken Thaiday Snr and Grace Lillian Lee's large scale collaboration, *Suggoo Pennise*, originally exhibited as part of APT10 at QAGOMA, Brisbane. We were also proud to showcase the incredible emerging talent of IndigeDesign Labs (IDL) participants, through their first exhibition *CONFLUENCE : Design*, *Technology and Culture*. A partnership between NorthSite and Ingeous Studios, IDL provides design and technology skills for Indigenous youth, through practical experience.

This year we also supported local artists to take up national opportunities through sector initiatives. For example, partnering with Situate 22-23 in Tasmania and Brisbane-based Outer Space Supercut program gave local artist's India Collins and Melania Jack greater access to national dialogue while facilitating their creative development toward upcoming NorthSite exhibitions. In addition, with support from the Australia Council Visual Arts and Craft Strategy (VACS), NorthSite engaged guest curator Tess Maunder to begin developing Planetary Gestures, an international exhibition for early 2023 that will provide opportunities for northern discourse.



An important milestone was NorthSite securing a long-lerm lease on the former Djumbunji Press and InkMasters facility at Edge Hill. Launching in 2023, NorthSite Art Studios will significantly increase our programming capacity, create paid opportunities for local artists to deliver workshops, and provide professional art studios for local and visiting artists from Cape York, the Torres Strait and beyond. In late 2022, we welcomed Katrina losia, as our new Programs Coordinator, who will lead our activation of the facility.

NorthSite's retail operations represent an important and growing revenue stream for the organisation as well as being an important source of income for Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists from across Tropical North Queensland. Our physical shopfront and website are the leading outlets to acquire ethically sourced artwork by artists from our region. 2022 was another bumper year for NorthSite retail, with more than \$250,000 in artwork sales, an extraordinary result which enables us to continue to support the livelihoods and career pathways of local artists. We are grateful to our board, funders, artists, partner organisations, and of course, our engaged and loyal audience, for their continued support in 2022. Thank you, and we look forward to welcoming you back to Bulmba-ja and our new NorthSite Art Studios for another exciting year of exhibitions, programs and events in 2023.

Thinking of Place iii is an international collaborative print exhibition that involves 87 artists from 16 printmaking groups participating with new artworks.

The exhibition invites artists to invoke a legend, myth, story or an aspect of ancestral heritage in relation to their personal identification with geography and environment. Cultural associations with concepts of land, country, colonisation and collective memories that adhere to places can thus be layered in potentially complex ways.

This international collaboration represents individual responses to both specific localities and shared cultural legacies.

The project constitutes an ambitious cultural exchange, involving groups from Argentina, Australia (x3), Canada, Denmark, Guam, New Zealand (x2), Turkey, United Kingdom (x2) and United States of America (x3).

Curated by Pacific Centre for Photographic Arts (PCPA), *Never So Visible* proposes the importance of personal experience and investigation in photography through the inclusion of six visual artists working with the medium. Diverse histories, environments and experiences converge in the gallery space, revealing six approaches to personal photography practice from all over the world; from India to China, Romania to Australia. With shared philosophies and appreciations, the chosen artists present elements of personal intimacy and engagement with their subjects, connecting themselves – and the viewers – with who and what is important to them.

Deep North is an ongoing project which examines interrelationships between ecology, psychology and the differing time scales within the landscapes of Far Northern Queensland. Produced over a ten year period the images chart the teeming surfaces, stilled recesses and storied topographies of these environments. The series considers the superimposition of spatial and biogeographical histories within the landscape creating dialogue between their political and mythopoetic associations.

NERELLE NICOL

See What I See

08 MARCH – 30 APRIL 2022 Poyer Wall

This exhibition, *See What I See*, shows the transition in Nerelle Nicol's photography with images offering different perspectives of subjects where some of her works could be described as abstract photography for example the 'Burie' series.

Based in Cairns, Nerelle is inspired by the detailed textures, colours and patterns found in our natural environment and subjects that are often overlooked. Creatively capturing photographs, she has always been guided to particular subjects and drawn to observe them more closely, through the eyes of her ancestors. This series of works reminds her of the strong connection and spiritual relationship between people, environment, animals, and landscape.

Nerelle is a cultural consultant and artist, with cultural heritage of Juru Birri-Gubba people of Bowen/Ayr region in North Queensland & Erubam Le, Ugaram Le people of Erub and Ugar Islands, Eastern Torres Strait. She was born and raised in Mossman on Kuku Yalanji Country and lives and works in Cairns on the homelands of the Yidinji and Djabugay people.

Vie Du Pacifique iii

Vie Du Pacifique iii celebrates the talent of 37 printmakers from across the Pacific region: Artists from four studios spanning the Pacific Coastal regions in Queensland Australia, as well as artists from California, Fiji, the Philippines and New Zealand. The exhibition offers an extensive range for visual and conceptual interpretation and in particular, this iteration of Vie Du Pacifique iii indicates the growing concern over climate change, Global warming, the environmental damage from our continually growing consumption of fossil fuels and overproduction of plastics and waste.

Wish You Were Here

23 APRIL – 11 JUNE 2022 Q Gallery 2

An immersive installation of collaged works on paper, projected animation, sound and Augmented Reality (AR) that transports the viewer into an uncertain landscape.

Created throughout the early days of the pandemic in 2020 and refined into 2022 during post-covid living, *Wish You Were Here* began as a response to lockdowns and has continued to develop with transforming elements of humour and oddity. In this site-specific installation, uncanny household objects collide with uncertain landscapes. In search of progress, multiple figures attempt to travel, yet go nowhere in this oddball world. Their figurative and abstract forms gently smash together as we all fumble for connection.

Through repetitive rhythm and monotonous loops, neon lights, Augmented Reality objects in nonspecific locations and an unspecified time, *Wish You Were Here* blends the physical and the psychological for a moment of hypnotic but joyful reprieve. Sound by Mick Dick and AR by Helena Papageorgiou.

Material Sound

Material Sound is a multi-form exhibition that draws together six art practitioners and collaborative groups, each creating an experience of sound within installations constructed from everyday materials. Handmade instruments and electronics, recycled components, outmoded technologies, fake technologies, imagined sounds, and silences are brought together to challenge the way we think about materiality in a cumulative sound experience. Material Sound features work by artists Vicky Browne, Pia van Gelder, Caitlin Franzmann, Peter Blamey, Vincent & Vaughan O'Connor and Ross Manning, whose works and practices investigate sound and materials within art and performance. These artists are at the forefront of an international interest in the material qualities of sound and its modes of generation. In Australia, this interest particularly addresses the ecological consequences of the materials we so readily consume and discard.

ELVERINA JOHNSON & FRANCOISE **LANE**

Gathering

13 MAY – 18 JUNE 2022 Long Wall

Gathering is a culture-based community collaboration, led by leading local artists Elverina Johnson and Francoise Lane. The sculptural form, represented a paperbark bulmba and invited further community interaction through workshops as part of the Women of the World Festival, Cairns.

Elverina Johnson of Paperbark Arts and Francoise Lane of Indij Design began the making of Gathering on Gungganji Country. The paperbark was woven into the mudi (lawyer cane) frame using swamp reed and rainforest twine to create the base for the collaborative art piece. Working with members of the community on Country oil pastels were applied to paperbark to create drawings inspired by themes of Country and the 'grounding' experience of the morning. During Women of the World Festival the artwork was built upon with themes inspired by the waterways weaving through Country; nurturing and sustaining life.

The artists in this show tell diverse stories from different First Nations cultures across Queensland, celebrating unique identities; owning the past to forge the future.

The installation was developed by the during an artist TAKEOVER project (Old Ambulance Station in Nambour, May 2022). Artists were supported to create new prints at NorthSite in April 2022, through the Fresh Ink project, made possible by the Australian Government's Regional Arts Fund, provided through Regional Arts Australia, administered in Queensland by Flying Arts Alliance.

NorthSite and Wik & Kugu Arts present the exhibition, Yuk Wuy Min Ngantamp, by senior artists of the Apelech Clan, Heather Koowootha and Keith Wikmunea.

Heather is a multi-disciplinary artist working in the mediums of printmaking, sculpture, painting, drawing, ceramics, and weaving. In this exhibition, Heather pays respects to her father and the women who taught her traditional culture from a young age. Heather's artworks share the knowledge of Wik culture and specifically the uses of native plants, bush dyes and bush fibres.

Keith Wikmunea is passionate about passing on his creative and cultural knowledge to future generations. Keith was born and raised in Aurukun and is from the language groups Wik-Alken (mother's side) and Wik-Mungkan (father's side). His artworks reflect his old people's Country at a place called Kencharang.

Nyungu Bubu: Stories from our Country

29 JUNE – 10 SEPTEMBER 2022 • Foyer Wall

An exhibition by artists from Bana Yirriji Art Centre, Wujul Wujul during CIAF 2022.

The Bana Yirriji Art Centre is situated alongside the spectacular Bloomfield River, a short walk from the famous Wujal Wujal Falls. Bana Yirriji Art Centre represents artists from the Yalanii. Nyungkul and Jalunji clan groups. In developing this body of work, the Bana Yirriji Artists considered concepts of sacredness. The title of the exhibition translates as Nyungu (our) and Bubu (Country). Bubu is also the term used for 'earth', which reflects the nature of these paintings that were created using locally found and processed earth pigments, by grinding local ochres into powder.

TRAVERSING THREE REALMS: The physical, natural and spiritual

Teho Ropeyarn is an artist and curator from Injinoo, Cape York Peninsula, Queensland, Born in Mount Isa in 1988. he holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts from the College of Fine Arts (UNSW) in Sydney and is currently based in Cairns, Queensland. Ropeyarn is descended from the Angkamuthiand Yadhaykana clans from Injinoo on the mainland, Badu, Moa and Murray Island in the Torres Strait; Woppaburra people (Great Keppel Island) and Batchulla people (Fraser Island). His practice is focused on his father's people's heritage. Having lived in Injinoo most of his life, he focuses on his Aboriginal heritage to keep what is remaining, alive.

Presenting this new series of prints using the Cape York Lily plant as a reference to home in Injinoo and country, these works are purposely displayed upsidedown to reflect the sacredness of land and the countless footprints that have shaped the stories. Our culture tells us that we go back to the land as Aboriginal people and become part of the surrounding environment. I have thought to change the way we see the landscape through our everyday western eye, and rather flip the imagery, to change the way we think about how Aboriginal people see the land. I have done this so to explore the notion of Aboriginal worldviews where that the land is not what you see when you know it from the inside out. This teaching comes from parents, family members, and elders as they continue to pass on generations of stories orally that continue to shape the land as a spiritual entity and life force. The Cape York Lily flower is reminiscent of family gathering and bush camping during the 90s on the east and west coast around Injinoo and northern Cape York. Teho Ropeyarn, 2022.

IndigeDesign Labs is a partnership between NorthSite and Indigenous design agency Ingeous Studios and has been supported by the John T Reid foundation over the three years of its evolution.

A collaboration between artist Grace Lillian Lee and artist and Elder Dr Ken Thaiday Senior (Meriam Mir people) of kinship. material culture and oral stories developed into a new large-scale artwork. Suggoo Pennise (2021) for the 10th Asia Pacific Triennial of Contemporary Art (APT10).

Collaborative cultural story telling by Grace Lillian Lee and Elder and mentor Dr Uncle Ken Thaiday Snr provided an opportunity to innovate and express their heritage through new contemporary materials and sculptural forms. The large spinning dhari (headdress) hanging over a circular three meters mirror provided shadow light play and the ability for the viewer to traverse the space to capture the view from many angles. The dhari form references traditional values encompassing saltwater themes through and costume and movement to express the living culture of the Meriam Mir people. The dhari represents the octopus and the shark with the double jaw. The two jaws of black and white, one right and one on the left, sees the whole dhari represent a fish trap on Darnley Island. The white and the black represents the seascape. The black is the rock and the white is the way the seafoam hits the rock, when you see the waves. The fish go through the channel and come out at the top of the sculpture and come down the channel underneath





The Bulmba-ja façade is a fitting platform to present some of the hand-cut stencils that the artist used to create his many luminous monoprints. The residue of coloured pigments captured on the stencils reveals an unintended aesthetic appeal that celebrates creative techniques pioneered by the artist. Mono Figures was the title of this public artwork on the Bulmba-ja LED facade, Cairns CBD.

Vibrant marine life stories of Zenadh Kes (Torres Strait Islands) abound through the Gab Titui Cultural Centre offering on the Bulmba-ja LED facade. Featuring artworks from Moana Ahwang, George Gabey, Laura De Jersey, and Jimmy K Thaiday, seafaring scenes portray crayfish freediving in bommies and dugong feeding trails in the shallows, with spanish mackerel game fish, mating turtles, and birds in flight. The shape of dugongs in the dhari (headdress) symbolically align with the swimming shark illustrating cultural connection. Depicting ancestorial totems and patterning through painting and linocut techniques relates deep knowledge and listening to the endemic wildlife that traverses and calls the region home.

CASE STUDY: FIRST NATIONS FIRST

NorthSite's activation of Bulmba-ja during the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair (CIAF) saw the entire venue come alive with exhibitions, performances, artist talks and events for Queensland and visiting audience's pleasure.

Celebrating the physical return of CIAF after two years of COVID restrictions, NorthSite hosted eight satellite exhibitions, which were positively received.


Artists gained invaluable exposure and collectors from around Australia were able to purchase works that spoke to them. NorthSite's CIAF program represents the organisation's strong connections to Country and Culture. In 2022, we had the pleasure of showcasing significant new works by leading practitioners directly from key national exhibitions. Taking advantage of CIAF visitors. NorthSite was able to accommodate these works both within the gallery and a range of additional spaces, alongside a range of talks on First Nations art and design. Allowing artists to present their works for kin. collectors, curators and the broader CIAF audience is evidence of NorthSite's ability to respond to community need. Leveraging Regional Arts Fund grants likewise supported independent artists to platform their work and increase their profile during the CIAF.

Partnering with Brisbane-based Onespace, NorthSite was able to present Injinoo artist Teho Ropeyarn's monumental commission Athumu Paypa Adthinhuunamu (my birth certificate) (2022), fresh from its premiere at the 23rd Biennale of Sydney. The sevenmeter print was presented alongside works created by Teho especially for CIAF, evidence of the artist's ability to explore personal narratives in a range of scales and formats. The artist was joined by collaborator Graham Brady in a conversation revealing cultural insights which provided additional context and meaning for the audience

NorthSite's support of a landmark collaboration between artist and designer Grace Lillian Lee and Elder Dr Ken Thaiday Senior allowed the Meriam Mir artists to share their work with their hometown audience. An exploration of kinship, material culture and oral stories, Suggoo Pennise (2021) was commissioned for the 10th Asia Pacific Triennial of Contemporary Art (APT10) by the Queensland Art Gallery I Gallery of Modern Art (QAGOMA) in Brisbane. The work's development enabled cultural knowledge transference to produce a multiple weave design as part of a largeformat installation based on the notion of 'the Island'. Uncle Ken's contribution and knowledge was instrumental in forging the ambitious new work of a large-scale kinetic dhari (headdress) incorporating Lee's signature use of the double 'grasshopper' weave in her adornment works.

Curated by Darren Blackman, the *Repatriate* exhibition comprised emerging and independent artists keen to illustrate the inequalities experienced by First Nations people through contemporary forms. Supported by a Regional Arts Fund grant, a week-long printmaking residency with master printer Elizabeth Hunter called *Fresh Ink* was organised to develop works for the exhibition. While the reverence of blak histories resounded in the work of participating artists Dylan Mooney, Dylan Sarra, Darren Blackman, Kyra Mancktelow, Dion Beasley and Bernard Singleton Jr, collective identity and experience was inherent to their project at NorthSite during CIAF.

Senior Wik-Mungkan and Yidinji/ Djabugay artist Heather Koowootha was in residence at NorthSite, painting and conversing with CIAF patrons as they visited the galleries. Along with regaling visitors with bush knowledge, Heather exhibited alongside Wik and Kugu artist Keith Wikmunea in the exhibition *Yuk Wuy Min Ngantamp*, exposing audiences to their living culture.

The immediacy of the works by artists from Bana Yirriji Art Centre spoke volumes to CIAF audiences. Nvungu Bubu: Stories from our Country introduced the sacredness of the Wujul Wujul Country to visitors. The collective knowledge of earth depicted with pigments and ochre created an atmospheric display. Placing these textures in juxtaposition with patterned textiles and fine art printmaking in the Bulmba-ja foyer heightened the sense of place and craftmanship, and profiled their works to the broader CIAF audience drawing acclaim and strong retail interest.

IndigeDesign Labs (IDL) presented *Confluence: Design, Technology and Culture* a pop-up studio, exhibition and forum, facilitated by NorthSite's Jamaylya Ballangarry-Kearins. New discoveries and emerging voices, shone with exciting work and innovative products selling strongly through the CIAF market stall and NorthSite Store. IDL's participation capped off an overwhelmingly successful three-year partnership between NorthSite and Ingeous Studios, generously supported by the John T Reid Foundation.

NorthSite was honoured to present Arone Meeks' enigmatic Mono Figures posthumously on the Bulmba-ja digital façade during CIAF. Working closely with noted artist Geoff Dixon and the Arone Meeks Estate, twenty of the late artist's stencils were transformed into digital images. Supported by Arts Queensland, the façade project has provided valuable exposure of lesser known First Nations artists from the region, as well as celebrating Meeks' iconic motifs.

The installation and performance, *One Man's Trash*, by Yidinji man Jaymen Leigh Drahm highlighted how culture is embodied in the human condition. The interdisciplinary artist's careful movements through a space filled with litter, reinforced performance as a medium to interpret a spirit trapped in a land full of trash. Viewers witnessed traditional artefacts alongside consumer detritus as the dancer upended ceremonial conventions by capturing remnants of his performance on canvas.

NorthSite's Artist Party made Bulmba-ja come alive with CIAF artists, performers and visiting dignitaries. Traditional Owner group Minjil presented their unique tri-nation Wi-Win ceremony. Artists present from each exhibition, who were not Traditional Owners, were welcomed and presented with handcrafted gifts. Djabugay Traditional Owner group the Pad Boys provided a very special music set for the CIAF preview event.

The art fair itself, held at the Cairns Convention Centre, generated reciprocal patronage at Bulmba-ja. NorthSite Curator Aven Noah Jr supported Uncle Peter Morrison to transform his drawings into 3D sculptural works for CIAF's Big Sculpture exhibition. NorthSite also convened an Art Market exhibition stall and separate merchandise stand showcasing ethically and locally sourced wares. Staff and interns gained valuable experience and generated sales through many positive interactions.

NorthSite's offerings added to the diversity of independent practitioners represented at CIAF and amplified their cultural voice to visiting curators and collectors.

CASE STUDY: INDIGEDESIGN LABS


LEIGH HARRIS

Led by award-winning Aboriginal designer Leigh Harris and coordinator Jamaylya Ballangarry-Kearins, IndigeDesign Labs celebrates its third year.

Seeking to tell First Nations Stories in innovative ways, the Lab explores relationships, people, culture and the environment through the use of new technology, art and design. Initially participants were novices in digital concepts and design. However, support from Carli Willis, Jamaylya Ballangarry-Kearins, Leigh Harris and guest mentors supported participants on their career pathway journey. Participants were upskilled in unpacking ideas around concept design processes, design pitches and mediums such as graphic design, virtual reality, online web applications and video production.

Gaining hands-on experience in the commercial sector is giving these young people access to resources and networks which validates themselves as practitioners while celebrating cultural values. Over the last three-years, key support from John T Reid Charitable Trusts allowed IndigeDesign Labs to develop and flourish through the significant partnership with Leigh and Ingeous Design Studios. Mostly comprised of secondary students, in that time participants have experimented with digital tools and platforms ina range of mediums and scale from bus-wrapping to electronic signage, from exhibitions to screenprinting and even design for creative software, providing them with a multifacted approach to design practice. Throughout the years, mentors have provided instrumental support for well-being, while nurturing participants' cultural creativity. Fostering life skills outside of

the program and business skills within has seen participants take on greater design challenges and art commissions in and around the Bulmba-ja precinct. The range of clients IndigeDedign Labs are working with includes Procereate and Kinetic, building the team's capacity and confidence to pitch for representation at the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair. Leigh's continual advocacy in the commercial and government sector for Indigenous design is ongoing as is the search for independent workshop premises. Immersive storytelling, skills development and workplace integrated learning this year showcased new designs in the retail and eCommerce.

STARLIGHT FOUNDATION **RECONCILIATION ACTION PLAN 4** Participants

The Starlight Children's Foundation RAP project recreates design motifs and cultural patterning for the 2022 initiative 'Healthier Futures'. Our participants came along to a series of workshops over a 3-week period in which creatives could review, edit, and renew the existing motifs and cultural decals for a more youthful and specifically Far North Queensland-style motif package.

CONFLUENCE DESIGN SHOWCASE & DESIGNERS TALK 4 9 Participants

To coincide with the launch of the streetwear brand, Big'Ole, IndigeDesign Labs also led a designers showcase at NorthSite Contemporary Arts during the annual Cairns Indigenous Art Fair. Presented through print, projection, photography, and textile design as well as a designer led discussion with a fantastic audience comprising local designers, artists, and teachers. The showcase was a brilliant way for IDL to flex and show the community what they do best.

BIG'OLE COMPANY 4 Participants

As a part of IndigeDesign Labs introduction to the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair a uniquely Far Northern streetwear brand called 'Big'Ole Co' was created led by IndigeDesign Labs young people. Based on discussions between the group about the previously Cairns-based landmark - a statue of Captain Cook, and the long-lasting effects that his presence (stone or bone) has on our culture, land, and sea, we felt the best way to approach these sorts of discussions was through comedic appeal. The brand was also an avenue to give our participant's the opportunity and experience to start a brand/label from start to finish with a hope that one of our participants will take over the managing of operations and generate income from the initiative.



In 2022, NorthSite's retail operations continued to grow from strength to strength, with sales of more than \$250,000.

This income represents an increasingly important source of revenue for NorthSite's operations, in addition to contributing to the livelihoods of Far North Queensland artists and designers.

This incredible result is testament to the hard work of our Gallery Store Manager, Lauren Carter, ably supported by NorthSite staff members Jamaylya Ballangarry-Kearins and Melania Jack. As evidenced through our results through the pandemic, our online sales platform has played a vital role in growing retail income. The introduction of Shopify Chat for example, yielded more than \$7,000 in artwork sales.

Paintings and prints were the most popular items sold in 2022, reflecting NorthSite's role as the leading outlet for ethically sourced artworks and design by artists from the region. The extraordinary Djumbunji Press archive of prints by FNQ Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists continues to perform strongly, with 48 prints sold in 2022, with works by Brian Robinson and the late Billy Missi being top sellers.

Our Wa Yo Way range of design products generated more than \$7,000 in sales, with items featuring artworks by Elverina Johnson and Lynelle Flinders proving popular.

We were delighted to welcome twelve new suppliers: Rhonda Duncan, Nicole Chatfield (Goompi's Girl), Misako Kido (Misa.Co), Garry Jillet, Naomi Evans, Roy Gray + Jo-Ann Beikoff (Bunda Art), Leanne Hardy (Blue Muse), Tamika Grant-Iramu, in addition to Josie Nawia, Babitha Nawia, Rosaline Tomsana, and Danie Savage from MOA Arts.

Our Art Agency commercial business continued to grow, with major clients including The Department of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships, Cairns Performing Arts Centre, Arup and Sodexo Australia.

Established in 2020, our annual Art Market initiative again shone a spotlight on Cairns-based jewellery and small object makers, with a salon style hang on the front Foyer wall. A total of 102 items were sold in the leadup to Christmas, with revenue of more than \$6,000, and more than half of that amount going directly to 16 local artists.

NorthSite also facilitated opportunities for artists beyond the region, supporting Kim Nolan to showcase her work as part of UNLEASHED 2022: Fresh Meet, an exhibition of the best emerging contemporary craft and design practitioners in Queensland at Artisan, Brisbane.

The focus of the communication reach in 2022 was to engage with regional Queensland and the Far North Queensland community.

Local enagament and promotion of the gallerys programs was through local media organisations, Tropic Group and ABC Far North. Highlights include Matthew Stanton exbition Deep North profile Photographer captures 'unsettling and disturbing' landscape changes by ABC Far North.

On the ground engagement was through poster distribution within the Cairns CBD and hotel advertisements, which assisted in engaging with visitors to Cairns. NorthSite continued to engage our local subscribers with the latest information from the gallery and

store being distributed through the e-news publications.

NorthSite produced a staggering 22 exhibition and artists videos to gain further reach with our local and national audience. See page 28 for links to a few of the key videos produced by NorthSite. Understanding the importance of engaging with our national audience, NorthSite continued to engage with five major art publications producing a range of adverts and listings to showcase the contemporary art of Far North Queensland.

Instagram saw the highest increased reach across our social platforms for 2022 with a 110.7% increase on the previous year. The use of social media assisted in promoting the galleries events, exhibitions, programs and the store to gain wider reach and engage with new audiences.



CULTURAL AWARENESS TRAINING

In February 2022, NorthSite team members undertook cultural awareness training on Country with Mandingalbay Authentic Indigenous Tours.

Traditional Owners and operator Mandingalbay Yidinji Aboriginal Corporation hosted NorthSite Board of Directors and Staff on their traditional Country for an immersive Eco Tour.

The Mandingalbay Yidinji People are the direct descendants of the Aboriginal people who have owned, occupied. cared for, and sustainably used their traditional lands, located east of Cairns, for thousands of years.

Travelling across the inlet by boat, staff and board members disembarked and witnessed a Welcome to Country and smoking ceremony, receiving knowledge about native foods and bush medicine. Together, learning about flora and fauna, traditions and customs and seeing artefacts and listening to stories gave all an insight into why where we live is so culturally rich.

WORKPLACE TRAINING

Jamie Clarke received Arts Marketing and Digital Competency mentoring from Elliott Bledsoe, through the Creative Business Champions (CBC) program run by the Regional Arts Services Network (RASN). Jamie learned about the 7Ps of marketing, framing, and building successful arts brands.

Aven Noah Jr attended the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair symposium, in his capacity as Curator and Exhibitions Officer.

Lauren Carter attended the Arts Law and Darwin Aboriginal Art Fair Foundation ARTS+LAW ICIP Zoom training webinar for Indigenous Fashion Projects, regarding collaborating ethically with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists. Lauren also attended 'Teach Your Craft' a Flying Arts workshop webinar with Alex Stalling, focusing on creativity practice and generating revenue streams.

Melania Jack completed the Digital Transformation for the Creative Industries course - a six-week, online course providing insight into digital strategy and new technologies. This course was delivered through Univeristy of Technology Sydney and The Australia Council.

AN eight-month partnership with Minjil Indigenous Cultural Group allowed emerging arts workers Jayden and Mykelle Bingarape-Carr to each undertake a paid internship.

Supported by Busy at Work, the initiaitve enabled the Indigenous trainees to work alongside NorthSite Staff and artists to gain valuable skills within exhibition and retail, and during the Cairns Indigenous Art Fair 2022 market.

WORK EXPERIENCE

In August and September, NorthSite hosted two high school students interested in exploring career paths within the visual arts. The St Monica's College and Woree State High School students each received an introduction in gallery processes such as installing. condition reporting and documenting art work

SECTOR ENGAGEMENT

FLAME 2022

FLAME is a mentorship program which provides professional arts industry experience for emerging female artists. Funded through philanthropic support and delivered in partnership with Cairns and Douglas Shire Regional Councils, six established artists mentored selected senior students from the 2021 IDENTITY exhibition. The project culminated in an exhibition at Tanks Art Centre from 26 February to 20 March, coinciding with International Women's Day.

ASIALINK'S REGIONAL REGIONAL' PROGRAM

In August, Aven Noah Jr and Ashleigh Campbell participated in Asialink's Regional // Regional in-person meeting in Darwin. The Regional Regional initiative connects arts workers from across Australia and the Indo-Pacific to improve and expand professional networks via bi-monthly online meetings, skill and experience sharing, discussion of relevant issues and identifying opportunities for collaboration.

BIG TALK ONE FIRE

Artistic Director / CEO Ashleigh Campbell was invited to present at Umi Arts' Big Talk One Fire Cultural Festival in October, on managing Northsite's gallery and associated programs. NorthSite staff attended the symposium and networked with regional stakeholders and artists.

PGQ DIRECTORS FORUM

On November 25, Artistic Director / CEO Ashleigh Campbell attended the Public Galleries Queensland Directors Forum held at The Condenserv and Alexandra Hall, Somerset Regional Council, Toogoolawah. As PGQ Vice-President, Ashleigh convened a panel discussion on "When disaster strikes' with Lismore Art Gallery's Curator Kezia Geddens and Outback Regional Art Gallery's Exhibition Supervisor Karen Stephens providing insights for attendees.



INDUSTRY PLACEMENTS

TAFE North Diploma of Visual Arts students Jo Miles and Naomi Evans undertook professional development with NorthSite over the year. The industry placement enabled the emerging practitioners to gain valuable experience installing exhibitions, while NorthSite Staff were thrilled to support the region's next generation of arts workers.

CARBON DATING

Carbon_Dating stretches across six sites as an experimental artwork which aims to seed 'consensual' partnerships between humans and Australian native grasses.

Supported by Regional Arts Development Funding, NorthSite assisted artists Keith Armstrong, Delissa Walker, Donna Davis and Daniele Constance in collaboration with James Cook University to seed and grow native grass and deliver an artist talk discussing our relationship to the environment.

PARTNERSHIPS

NorthSite forges strategic partnerships with a range of state and national peer organisations, to create invaluable development and presentation opportunities for Far North Queensland artists, allowing them to participate in the broader contemporary arts ecology. In 2022 we forged **55 partnerships**.

THE 'M E R I' PROJECT

P Brisbane Powerhouse

Photographs and sound scapes from Wendy Mocke's *The meriproject* were presented at the Brisbane Powerhouse, as part of the Woman of the world. The 'meri' project was first presented on Gimuy Walubara Yindiji country and Yirrganydji country at Northsite Contemporary Arts in 2021.



QAGOMA | DESIGN TRACKS

NorthSite Contemporary Arts partnered with QAGOMA and the Queensland Department of Education to deliver its Design Tracks program in Cairns for the first time. The initiative supports First Nations secondary school students from across Queensland to hear from leaders in the creative industries about their career pathways and identify options for their own professional journey.

NorthSite facilitated the participation of local presenters as well as cultural facilitators, which provided participants with a unique on country experience. NorthSite's Gallery Officer and IndigeDesign Labs coordinator, Jamaylya Ballangarry-Kearins, presented a short talk to participants about Indigenous peoples taking space in industries like the tech. app development, design, film and television industries. NorthSite's curator Aven Noah Jr also hosted a tour of Northsite's gallery exhibitions, talking to students about the importance of First Nations representation in the arts and design industry.

OUTER SPACE | SUPERCUT

Bruce Highway, 3.2km west of Bundaberg Airport on Isis Highway Outbound, Bundaberg, Queensland

• Outer Space Brisbane

SUPERCUT is an Outer Space project supported by the Federal Government's RISE (Restart Investment to Sustain and Expand) COVID recovery fund and is presented in partnership with Artspace Mackay and NorthSite Contemporary Arts, Cairns.

SUPERCUT is focused on creating opportunities for regional artists, and arts workers throughout Queensland. The project showcased new work by more than forty emerging artists on billboards across regional Queensland, in the Outer Space Window Gallery, and through a series of curated, online exhibitions. In March 2022, Cairns-based artist Melania Jack presented her projection sculpture *Strike* in Outer Space's Window Gallery in Brisbane. Following on from this, in July, Robert Tommy Pau's 2021 artwork *Time*, originally presented in his exhibition at NorthSite that year, was presented as a large scale billboard on the Bruce Highway just south of Bundaberg.

SITUATE 22-23 | INDIA COLLINS **9** lutruwita/Tasmania

SITUATE 22-23 is a program dedicated to the creation of ambitious work by emerging and mid-career region artists within the context of social engagement. It prioritises artistic excellence while also ensuring that the process and outcomes benefit both artists and communities alike.

In May 2022, NorthSite Artistic Director / CEO Ashleigh Campbell travelled to Lutruwita/Tasmania with Cairns based artist India Collins and the cohort of Australian artists, provocateurs and partner organisations for the Situate 22-23 program.

Ashleigh and India met with producers, examining festival models and modes of production and workshopped the development of a major new work by India Collins.

Following the intensive week of Lab sessions, India pitched her concept to mentors, peers, festival producers and provocateurs. Her presentation was met with wide enthusiasm for the project concept.


